Textiles Forum

MRWA conducted a review of recycling credits for textiles funded through sponsorship of Envirolink Research. Workshop undertaken with charities and other recipients. Decision by Authority Members to cap recycling credits for textiles and reinvest remainder of budget in 2012/13 to incentivise greater textile recycling. Textile Stakeholder Forum to be established, Merseyside textile mapping exercise to be undertaken and Strategy for increased textile recycling on Merseyside to be established by November 2012 with WRAP support.
