Action required by business and Government before LAs can collect more plastic packaging for recycling.

WRAP Plastics Recycling Proposals

As part of the development of a new Resource and Waste Strategy, WRAP have been tasked with developing outline proposals to improve plastics recycling and packaging. Following stakeholder engagement WRAP circulated an open letter on 12.02.18 with suggestions including:

- Action by businesses to change how they design and use plastic packaging
- Action by Government to reform the plastic packaging producer responsibility regulation
- Action by local authorities and the recycling sector to increase the quantity and quality of plastic packaging collected for recycling; and
- Action by citizens to change how they use and dispose of plastic packaging.

Government Response to Environment Audit Committee Report on Plastic Bottles

The response was published on 26.02.18 and confirmed Government plans to tackle plastic as part of a wider review of the producer responsibility packaging waste system.

Government Response to Environmental Audit Committee Report on Disposable Coffee Cups The response was published on 05.03.18 and rejected proposals for a 25p levy of disposable takeaway cups in favour of voluntary measures to offer discounts to customers providing their own reusable cup.

Review of Packaging Recycling Obligations

The National Audit Office review was announced 09.03.18 following the recent Environmental Audit Committee inquiries above and will consider the Packaging Recovery Note (PRN) system and the effectiveness of Government's oversight of it. Findings are expected in Summer 2018. Link to NAO review

WRAP are also coordinating a series of cross-sector meetings in March on reform of the packaging waste system. Reform of the system is expected to be a theme of the new Resources and Waste Strategy expected later in 2018.

Separate Collection of Recyclables Duty

The Environment Agency is contacting WCAs with low recycling rates to check on their compliance with the separate collection duty in the Waste (England and Wales) Regulations 2012.

UK Waste Statistics 2016 2016 figures were published on 22.02.18 and the UK achieved a waste from households recycling rate of 45.2% including metals recovered from Incinerator Bottom Ash (IBA). All UK countries increased their performance on 2015 with Wales achieving 57.3%, England 44.9%, Northern Ireland 43.0% and Scotland 42.8%. Brexit Negotiations Provisional agreement has been reached on a transition period following Brexit in March 2019, pending EU Members States approval at the European Council meeting over March 22–23. The Transition would require the UK to continue to implement new EU legislation, but without a formal role in shaping it. The period would end on 31.12.20 at the same time as the 2014–2020 EU budget. European Union (Withdrawal) Bill The Bill is continuing its progress through Parliament and is now being examined by the House of Lords. Discussion continues on 26.03.18. EU Circular Economy Package The legislative revisions of the Package are passing through approval processes in Brussels and are expected to receive final approval by Member States in June 2018. Chinese Waste Import Restrictions The Chinese Ministry of Environmental Protection introduced restrictions on a range of recyclable waste imports including plastics and paper on 01.01.18 with restrictions on contamination applying from 01.03.18. The UK Government is monitoring the situation and impact on UK exporters and recycling markets.	Market values of some recyclables falling as end markets restricted.
